## Past Department Commander Norman Tapken Reports to Post Everlasting



Norman Tapken 91 of Wessington Springs passed away Wednesday evening March 15, 2023 at the Avera Wesskota Memorial Medical Center. Norm was born on July 21, 1931 to John and Emma Tapken at his parents home in Viola Township Jer-auld County.

He was united in marriage to Betty Krammer in 1957 and he brought 2 small children into the marriage. Later he married Wanda Holeton on March 17, 1978.

Norm served in the US Navy and was stationed aboard the USS Thomas Jefferson. While in the US Air Force from Feb 1953 to Oct. 1974, he was stationed in Texas, Wyoming, Georgia, French Morocco, Iceland, Washington, Alaska, Florida, Thailand, Oregon, and Alaska again. He retired out of Ellsworth A. F. B. in Rapid City in 1974, as a Master Sergeant.

Norm attended grade and high school in Lane, SD. He was a member of Zion Lutheran Church in Wessington Springs.

The organizations that Norm belonged to were Life member of VFW Post #548, Life member of American Legion Post #14, both in Wessington Springs. The offices he held in the American Legion were Post Commander for 3 years, Dist. 6 Vice Commander for 2 years, Dist. 6 Commander for 2 years, State Area Vice Commander for 1 year and State Commander from 1999 - 2000.

Norm is survived by his wife Wanda of 45 years; 3 daughters Norma Tapken of Texas, Linda (Terry) Lentz of Parkston; Vicki (Randall) Eggert of Brandon; 1 stepdaughter Marian (Glen) Perkins of Alabama; 6 grandchildren, 13 great grandchildren, 1 step grandchild, 3 step great grandchildren, 2 great-great grandchildren; 1 sister Thelma Hansen of Rapid City. Norm is also survived by 2 sisters-in-law Bonnie Will of Las Vegas and Wessington Springs, and Liz (Dave) Gaikowski of Mitchell, 2 brothers-in-law Michael (Jane) Holeton of Rapid City, John (Jan) Holeton of Sioux Falls; and many nieces, nephews, great nieces and nephews, and great nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his wife Betty in 1973, 3 brothers Vernon, Wendell, George. 1 sister Gertrude Schramm, stepson Allen Krammer, step grandson Brad Chambers, parents John and Emma Tapken mother and father-in-law, 4 brothers-in-law and 4 sisters-in-law.

## White's Post 88 Starts Rifle Club Fundraising Effort



The Deubrook Rifle Marksmanship Club received a donation Monday, January 30th, from the Higgins-Jessen-Olson Post #88 of White, for \$350 to get their fundraising efforts well underway as they seek funds to buy equipment for the recently established group. The Club was started this last fall with a vision presented by Post Member Marc Hopfinger to Deubrook Superintendent Kim Kludt and Activities Director Brad DeBeer to offer a club activity at the school that promotes safety, discipline, and practice in the use of air-rifles to learn about the life-long sport of marksmanship. The Club currently has 13 members and is working on recruiting more as they acquire equipment in preparation for the start of actually shooting. Marc has been instrumental in getting the club going and has arranged for a significant donation of 20 rifles from the Brookings 4H program, 13 of which work and the others will be useful for dry-fire training and safety demonstrations. The Club has recently obtained three complete sets of shooting equipment to aid in safety while shooting, and through a generous donation has obtained insurance so that the team can start shooting once they have obtained the goal of their current fundraiser - a new shooting backstop.

The Deubrook school has agreed to let the Club use the Auxiliary Gym of the White School, but to do so safely, the team needs something that will catch the BBs and pellets so that the building will remain in good condition. The Club has found a purpose built portable back-stop that will accommodate three lanes of shooters for about \$1900, and they are working with local organizations to raise the money. The White American Legion Post has agreed to help with this fundraising efforts by donating a portion of their monthly Community Breakfast profits to support this current effort, and further fundraising efforts as the club grows and expands their inventory. With the donation from the Post and others from local organizations, the Club is well on their way to reaching their first goal of getting the back-stop. Fur-

ther fundraising efforts will be performed as the club works to upgrade their rifle inventory and buy a second backstop so that six shooters can practice at one time. If you are interested in more information about the Club, or to make a donation, please contact Post Adjutant Matt Lagerstrom or Marksmanship Club Advisor Marc Hopfinger, and as always, please consider joining the Post for their monthly Free-will donation Community Breakfast on February 19th at the Hall in White.

## APRIL IS NATIONAL DONATE LIFE MONTH

The Children's Organ Transplant Association was founded in April 1986 when residents of Bloomington, Indiana, rallied around a toddler who needed a life-saving liver transplant. In less than eight weeks, the community raised more than \$100,000 to place the boy on the organ waiting list. Sadly, he died before an organ was found. Those



community volunteers, along with his parents, turned tragedy into triumph by using the funds to help other transplant families. That was our beginning, and those volunteers were our first Miracle Makers.

For more than 35 years, thanks to the commitment of the men and women of The American Legion Family, we have assisted thousands of children and young adults by helping to raise funds for a lifetime of transplant-related expenses. Extensive volunteer networks across the nation are working to ensure that no child or young adult needing an organ or tissue transplant is excluded from a transplant waiting list due to lack of funds.

We need your help today to make sure that tragedies, like the one that was the catalyst in founding COTA, are not repeated.

The United States achieved a historic milestone in 2022 with one million transplants performed – more than any other country in the world. However, 17 people die each day in the United States waiting for an organ transplant. Another person is added to the nation's organ transplant waiting list every nine minutes. One organ donor can save eight lives. April is National Donate Life Month, and I am asking everyone within The American Legion Family to go to [www.RegisterMe.org](http://www.RegisterMe.org) and register to be a designated organ and/or tissue donor.

You can become a COTA Miracle Maker. Find out how your Post, Unit, Squadron or Legion Riders can help a transplant family near you by visiting [COTA.org/Legion](http://COTA.org/Legion). COTA's priority is to assure that no child or young adult is denied a transplant or excluded from a waiting list due to lack of funds.

The American Legion will celebrate its 104th birthday on March 15, 2023.

On that date in 1919, the first American Legion caucus, held by members of the American Expeditionary Force, convened in Paris. Much as the birthday of the United States is celebrated on July 4 - for the date in 1776 when patriots declared the independence of the British colonies and birthed the spirit of America - March 15 is the date when The American Legion came to life.

The South Dakota Department of the American Legion was organized simultaneously with the national organization. South Dakota Adjutant General William A. Morris named Theodore R. Johnson of Sioux Falls to select a committee of representative ex-service men to attend the first caucus in St Louis, Missouri, May 8-10, 1919.

Throughout the national organization's history, local posts across the country have celebrated with festivities that have included the entire community. For the 20th birthday in 1939, Battle Mountain Post 71 in Hot Springs, S.D., brought out a 40-pound birthday cake - two pounds for every year of The American Legion's history. For the 38th birthday in 1957, Post 214 in Upper Darby, Pa., hosted an entire week's worth of events as part of American Legion Birthday Week, so proclaimed by the township's Board of Commissioners. Parties, dances and a two-act play were held at Post 214's clubhouse. These are but a few of the celebrations that have made the American Legion an important part of community, state and national prominence over the last 104 years.

Yes, you read it correctly the first time.

This is a portion of the Preamble to the Constitution and By Laws of an American Legion Post. And THIS is the reason Amer-

ican Legion Leadership has been asking for Posts to update their Constitutions and By Laws.

BUT WAIT, THERE IS MORE! The same Constitution and By Laws said their dues were \$3.00 per year and they were signed in 1920.

A Post's Constitution and By Laws, as well as those of the Departments and the National Organization are meant to be "living documents", and periodically updated as situations change in the organization.

The Constitution and By Laws are the governing documents of your Post. No matter how minor a change may seem, even though it may be in Post Meeting Minutes, if it changes your Post operations, the change needs to be reflected in your Constitution and By Laws.

A good practice would be to review and revise these documents at least every two years and submit a copy to State Headquarters.

A short amount of time spent now might save your Post some trouble in the future.



# Beresford Youth Wins South Dakota American Legion's High School Oratorical Scholarship Contest

HURON – Elena Andrews emerged victorious as the top orator in the final round of competition of The South Dakota American Legion High School Oratorical Scholarship Program, “A Constitutional Speech Contest” in Huron this past weekend. Elena is the daughter of Michelle and Jim Andrews of Beresford.

First, contestants were required to deliver a prepared oration of 8-10 minutes on the U.S. Constitution. Second, a constitutional topic was assigned to the contestants and a 3-5-minute extemporaneous oration was required on that topic. They were allowed five minutes of preparation time.

Each of the 5 contestants in the finals had previously won competition at the local and district levels of competition. Those eligible to compete at the finals this past weekend and their placings were: Elena Andrews, Beresford – 1st place trophy and \$1500; Reagan Blackburn, Aberdeen – 2nd place trophy and \$1000; Calister Grimsley, Spearfish – 3rd place trophy and \$500; and finalists Alex Vonderau, Rapid City, and Jordan Musser, Colome, each received a state finalist trophy and \$200.

Elena will also receive a plaque to be displayed in her high school's trophy case as the first-place winner of the state contest. She will have the opportunity to represent The South Dakota American Legion at the National Contest, to be held April 21-23 in Indianapolis, Indiana. Elena will receive an additional \$2,000 scholarship for participating in the first round of competition at the national level and an additional \$2,000 if she advances to the second round of national competition but does not make it into the final round. Scholarship awards possible in the national level

competition are \$25,000 for first place, \$22,500 for second place, and \$20,000 for third place.

Since 1938, The American Legion High School Oratorical Scholarship Program has encouraged the

nation's high school students to study the U.S. Constitution and to hone their public speaking skills. For their endeavors, they are rewarded with substantial scholarships if winning at the National level.

## Buddy Checks

In the beginning of March, Buddy Check letters were mailed out from POST 15, checking on Legion members. Responses have since flooded for membership renewals, death reporting and the occasional “I'm okay” or “Sorry I have not been in touch.” However, last week, a gentleman from Napa, California named John sent an “amazing reaffirming letter” to the Post 15 Commander Bill Peters. Take the time to read John's letter below and remember why we do what we do at all levels of the American Legion.

*Thank you for reaching out to me and the nice reminder to renew my membership. I renewed online. My family and I are doing well; healthy and we have everything we need. Your letter kind of struck a nerve with me. I served in the Army from 1971 to 1973 as an MP. Since I had a low lottery number and no money to continue in college, I volunteered for the draft since that was the quickest way to do my time and qualify for the GI Bill. Unlike so many veterans, the thought of serving my country really didn't occur to me. By 1972 the Vietnam War was winding down and I got sent to Germany and then to Ft. Knox. Had some wonderful experiences in Germany. Went to the Olympics and traveled throughout Bavaria. I got invited on trips because I spoke a little German.*

*I got out three months early since I had enrolled in school and agreed to serve a year in the active reserve. So, for a little more than two years' time commitment and not encountering any combat, I had full veterans' benefits. The most valuable was the GI Bill. After I got out, the CO of the reserve unit I joined was the county District Attorney and he helped me get a job with the local sheriff's office as a radio dispatcher. A full-time job, with benefits, that allowed me to go to school full-time. Between that job and the GI Bill, I paid for all my expenses, and then some and got married too. After a couple years, I got a job with a CPA firm and bought my first house with a VHA loan. That was my first house and when I sold it, it was the first time I had any real money. Not that much, but it seemed like it at the time. Roll forward 47 years and I have been so lucky to have had a career that I enjoy and a great family that now includes two grandchildren.*

*The reason I relate this to you is that I now realize what a great experience I had and how many benefits I received for the very little time and sacrifice I made while in the Army. Your letter spurred me to take some action to find a way to give back and find a way to help veterans' organizations and veterans. I've never gotten involved in the Legion. I joined because I was running a company that had many veterans who were amputees as clients, and I thought it would give me some insight to veterans' issues. Considering what some veterans have been through, I didn't think they would relate to me. I'm going to contact our veterans' organizations here in California and find a place where I can contribute something, whatever that is.*



With the impending start of Legion Baseball, there is information that you need to know! Last Fall, as many of you have heard, the National American Legion Organization, rolled out new Brand Marks and Logos. The American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, Sons of the American Legion, American Legion Riders, and American Legion Baseball were all introduced to their new Brand Marks, Word Marks, and Logos, along with a very specific set of guidelines of when, where, and how they are to be used in conjunction with the original American Legion Emblem.



At that time, we were told that as far as Baseball was concerned, teams would be able to choose either the old or new logo for the 2023 season but starting in 2024, they would have to use the new logo. Since then, National has updated their stance to the following:

Per the National Rulebook, uniforms must have the crossed bats emblem on the uniform. "To clarify things, the "Emblem" is defined as the Legion emblem with cross bats and the "Brand Mark" is defined as the new design logos. Please ensure you educate your team managers and others on these terms to ensure everyone is on the same page when discussing the two types." To answer everyone's question regarding team uniforms.

1. Team uniforms will have the cross bats emblem on left sleeve or chest as outlined in accordance with national rule.

2. For digital marketing only (website, social media, email signatures, etc.) we are approved to use the new baseball marks. This includes ESPN, social influencers, anything that is clearly advertising or promotional. Please see the Baseball page at [sdlegion.org](http://sdlegion.org) for specific directions on how to use the new Brand Marks

It is unknown at this time if the patch will change anytime in the future. If teams have budget concerns re: the possibility of having to change patches sometime in the future, it is suggested that they use the sew-on patch that can be ordered via Emblem Sales that can be sewn on and be easily removed and replaced later if needed, rather than sublimating or silk screening the emblem on the jersey.

Patches can be purchased from the Department Headquarters Office or on-line at Emblem sales.
